THE PLUMBERS CHARITY 2024

The Plumbers Charity is changing lives for the better in everything we do!

Our vision is to promote: Better Plumbers, Better Plumbing, Better Health and Better Lives

We continue our focus in making a real difference to the lives of people both here in the UK and internationally, through our support of projects that improve the provision of clean water, sanitation, improving public health and community welfare.

All achieved through your wonderful support and donations!

In 2024, with your valued support, we have delivered some life changing projects both in the UK and abroad and have supported various charities in the City of London.



We continue our support of the excellent charity through our sponsorship of medical detection dog Plum, who is part of a team of four dogs who work in the Community Medical Detection Dogs project, to assist in the detection of urinary tract

infections (UTI) in the community. Plum has also aided Research and Development and Continuation Training, using her amazing nose in the organisation's specially built Bio-Detection facility.





In 2024, we confirmed a new 3-year partnership with Aquabox, who provide emergency water filters across the globe where access to clean water has been affected by natural disasters or conflict. Through our support, Aquabox

have upgraded their manufacturing workshop to double the output of their amazing water filters from 3,000 to 6,000 filters so they can support even more people in need, called Project Aquaboost!

village by village

We have been supporting Village by Village, for several years, with the work they do providing clean water and sanitation for villages across Ghana, and also essential training on the maintenance of the facilities and basic hygiene training.

Our support has also enabled them to demonstrate to thousands of children how to correctly wash their hands with soap and running water after going to the toilet, and before cooking, and thereby very cost effectively reducing potential illness and saving lives. It allows children from remote rural villages to dream bigger by giving them more time to access education because they are spending less time collecting water for their families and given children from remote rural villages access to primary health care.






Continuing our work with the Dolma Foundation in the Dhunche region of Nepal. Using some of the plumbers from our first Plumbers Training project, we have funded a scheme to install freshwater tanks, and delivery pipes, and taps to the village of Thade, and 150 households now have access to water, up to 10,000 litres per day. Battling through the monsoons, the project took a little longer than expected, but it is great to see the smiling faces of the villagers whose lives are now improved with the delivery of a safe and reliable water source, something that we take for granted.



FREEDOM AND LIVERY COMMITTEE

The prime function of the Freedom and Livery Committee, the Company's "Senior Committee", is to provide overall strategic guidance to the Court and the other committees, and to ensure they follow the principles of its aims and objectives as laid down in the Company's Charter and Ordinances.

Following the review of the Company's Strategic Plan, the strategic actions arising from it were prioritized, with the principal ones highlighted. These will be kept under continuous review and the top three were identified as maintaining Court governance, keeping all the committees fresh by reviewing their actions and governance, and continuing to improve communications.

Appointment of and mentoring of Court members is a key aspect of Court governance and, as happens from time-to-time, some adjustments to the sequence of appointing Masters and Wardens were agreed. Invariably changes to individual's personal and professional circumstances have to be accommodated to maintain a healthy Court succession. We were also delighted to appoint Liveryman Julie Spinks, the Managing Director of Water Regs UK, as a new Court Assistant.

The Coronation Planters, designed in conjunction with the Gardeners' Company, to celebrate the coronation of



King Charles III and Queen Camilla were created by our outstanding volunteers at the Plumbers' Museum Workshop in Amberley and delivered to Sandringham House. We hope to be able to formally present them to Their Majesties on a suitably agreed date.

We will have to move offices in 2025, probably in August, as Carpenters' Hall is closing for refurbishment and new offices have been identified in Painter-Stainers' Hall. This will involve some downsizing and a review of all our treasures and stocks is underway to ensure we will fit comfortably in our new location. Our new landlords will be completely refurbishing the new offices for us.

While on the subject of our office location, an earlier Plumbers' Hall has been discovered. It was used prior to the one in Chequer Yard, which we have marked with a plaque and statue at Cannon Street Station. This earlier Hall was leased from the Vintners' Company for over a century and sat in Anchor Lane adjacent to their Hall. Discussions are ongoing to mark this with another plaque at that location.

Continuing on an historical theme, all our ancient Court records are being transcribed to make them much more readily accessible and this has been completed up to the year 1798. Work continues on this into the 19th Century records.

Looking forward, we have signed up to support the City of London initiative to make the City carbon neutral by 2050. We are looking at where we can most bring influence to bear, particularly through our links with the plumbing and heating industry.

Finally, we were also delighted to increase our military Cadet affiliations in 2024 to include No 1147 Squadron Air Cadets in Barking and 23 Detachment (Royal Engineers) Army Cadets in Islington. They honoured us by providing a joint Guard of Honour at our Summer Festival in Haberdashers' Hall in July.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

It's been an exciting, interesting and busy year for the Membership Committee. We clothed 27 new Liverymen and ended the year with around 350 Liverymen. Before I cover the year, I think it's useful to explain the full range of the committee's activities.

We drive recruitment into the Livery. we develop engagement and retention schemes to ensure the membership feel they are valued and are getting value for their input. Also, we run a Corporate Member's scheme. This year we launched our special scheme to support talented young professionals in the plumbing industry with all aspects of career development. It's called the Plumbing Professionals Development Scheme (PPDS). It was developed with The Chartered Institute of Plumbing and Heating Engineering (CIPHE) and we jointly run the scheme. Two further independent committees report into us and they are: Admissions (interviewing) panel and the Women in the Livery Group (WIL) who aim to increase our diversity by inspiring more women to enjoy the benefits of the Livery.

This year has been a bumper year for recruitment into the Livery and three quarters of it is due to the stellar input of one Liveryman, John Wilson. Also, during the year, we have developed an exciting set of plans and actions to build upon this initiative and continue with this volume of recruitment. This will most likely be spread throughout the Livery. Our overriding aim is to create a culture of continuous recruitment amongst the whole Livery.

Alongside these bold recruitment plans we are also developing plans to create a range of actions that will ensure all Liverymen are engaged to whatever level they seek. This is in addition to engagement actions, hosting and induction evenings, for new Liverymen already underway.

In the hosting scheme, each new Liveryman is hosted by an experienced Liveryman at the first two events they attend. Thus, supporting the new Liverymen to establish their own networks within the Livery. Both new Liverymen and hosts enjoy this and it's been the start of many friendships.





The induction evening each September for new Liverymen takes place in the Aldermanic dining room in the Guildhall, which has the most magnificent view of the City.

This event aims to build upon the developing sense of community among recent joiners, create a deeper understanding of the company aims, initiatives and inner workings. And learn about new Liverymen's views about their experience so far.

Attendees complimented us on their welcome to date and inclusiveness. We had a wide-ranging discussion expertly facilitated by the Master, ensuring that all participated. The two big discussion topics were diversity and charitable giving.

The Corporate Members scheme is a vital part of the Company's structure and appeal. And in these challenging times we have retained a strong core membership group and continue to offer executives of member companies a unique opportunity to network at a high level with fellow professionals across the

wider construction sector. The committee continue to work hard to refresh membership benefits and offer increased value for money.

Our young professionals emerging talent scheme PPDS was launched in January 2024. It has three key elements: continuing professional development, mentoring and introduction to relevant networking events supported by industry bodies and associations.

There are 10 talented young professionals in the first intake, who have all completed at least NVQ Level 2. Eight men and two women. Three of them, Daisy Turner, Tiffany Baker and Ruben Duggan, were already award winners when the scheme started. In September 2024 Ruben surpassed these achievements by demonstrating exceptional skills across a very challenging task to win the Plumbing & Heating silver medal at WorldSkills 2024 in France, shortly after the Olympic Games.

No Life without Water ... Saving Lives with Water in a Humanitarian Crisis

On 13th May 2024, the Company experienced an insightful and impactful Annual Lecture from speaker Gareth Owen OBE, Humanitarian Director at Save the Children UK, who talked about his thirty year career and the places he has worked, starting as a 24 year-old in Somalia, to the current devastating humanitarian crisis in Gaza.

Gareth explained a range of practical examples of how Save the Children have brought water, sanitation and hygiene to different communities. This is central to everything the organisation does. For example the reason many girls don't go to schools is due a lack access to sanitation.



Gareth introduced his colleague Rachel Cummings, who explained the devastating scenes on the ground. It was impossible not to be moved by the plight of refugees.

His final message was about hope: 'Choose hope everybody, choose to engage, choose hope and human connection and turn that into action'

Her prime responsibility as MD of Water Regs UK, is to lead the organisation and its subsidiary WRAS with a group turnover of circa £2m with activities including:

- strategy and business planning
- providing development opportunities for water fittings enforcement professionals and facilitating development of internal and external guidance

- certification body for plumbing professionals on behalf of 15 water companies
- the largest UK independent certification body for plumbing products
- stakeholder engagement including collaboration with governments and regulators to support policy development
- promotion and awareness of the water fittings regulations

Julie has extensive experience leading teams protecting drinking water from source to tap and proven ability to operate effectively at board level in both executive and non-executive roles. Strong influencing skills and extensive experience of working with key stakeholders collaboratively to deliver better outcomes. This includes UK water companies, government departments, drinking water quality regulators and the key trade and professional associations working in the water and plumbing sector.



Julie became a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Plumbers in 2014 and Chairs our Education & Technical Committee. During lock-down she copresented our online annual lecture on water efficiency. She is married with two children and lives in Altrincham.









PLUMBING MUSEUM AND WORKSHOP TRUST

2024 has again been an exceptionally busy year for our Lead Craft Workshop located at Amberley Museum.

The large planters to commemorate the coronation of the King and Queen were completed and delivered to Sandringham House. Following their installation, they have been expertly planted by the Worship Company of Gardeners for all visitors to the house to see. This has been a large, complex and successful project for us to deliver with the Gardeners Company.

A film showing the process of the manufacture and delivery of the planters to Sandringham House has been produced with great thanks to Liveryman Jason Clark. This is available on our website.

The funding of the large planters was assisted by the production of small commemorative planters for which the members of the Plumbers and Gardeners Companies could make a donation. These proved hugely popular and over 70 planters were requested in approximately equal numbers from each Company.

The Master and veterans were treated to a demonstration of how lead is poured and cast, and they were talked through the skills and technicalities that needed.
